# Digital Citizenship & Safety

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MR. BRIAN DOUGHERTY: BLENDED LEARNING SPECIALIST

Internet safety starts with understanding what safe online behavior is, and who your children should and shouldn't be talking to online

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- Biggest danger facing kids online is themselves, and posting something they will regret later.
- Kids should know what is appropriate to talk about online, and when to block, ignore or leave an unwanted conversation
- Know the warning signs (e.g. spends hours online, withdrawn, overly emotional, a major change in behavior, avoiding technology or seemingly cannot stop)

# Privacy & Security

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Children should think critically about sharing information requested by websites and what types of information sharing will put them at risk for identity theft.

- Be cautious about sharing any personally identifiable information online (e.g. name, address, phone, school, usernames, etc.)

# Digital Footprint

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- All of the information online about a person either posted by that person or others, intentionally or unintentionally.
- Mistakes that are made online may last forever
- Students need good digital citizenship skills to protect their online reputation for future college admission or employment

# Cyberbullying

Willful and repeated harm(i.e., harassing, humiliating, or threatening text or images) inflicted through the Internet, interactive technologies, or mobile phones.

- Over 80 percent of teens use a cell phone regularly, making it the most popular form of technology and a common medium for cyber bullying
- About half of young people have experienced some form of cyber bullying, and 10 to 20 percent experience it regularly

# What to do about Cyberbullying

- Talk to teens about cyber bullying, explaining that it is wrong and can have serious consequences.
- Encourage teens to tell an adult if cyber bullying is occurring.
- Teens should keep cyber bullying messages as proof that the cyber bullying is occurring.
- Try blocking the person sending the messages.

## What's the right age to get a kid a smartphone or other device?

The short answer: there really isn't an exact age that's best; it's different for every kid. One thing parents can do is consider their kid's maturity level. Here are some questions to help determine if your kid is ready:

- Does your kid show a sense of responsibility, such as letting you know when they leave the house? Do they show up when they say they will?
- Does your kid tend to lose things, such as backpacks or homework folders? If so, expect they might lose an expensive(!) phone, too.

- Would easy access to friends benefit your kid for social reasons?
- Do you think they'll use cell phones responsibly — for example, not texting during class or disturbing others with their phone conversations?
- Can they adhere to limits you set for minutes talked and apps downloaded?
- Will they use text, photo, and video functions responsibly and not to embarrass or harass others?

## How do I set ground rules to make sure my kids use their devices responsibly?

Some will help you agree on healthy limits. (Yep, you read that right. We said agree.) Some of the questions are meant to be conversation starting so you can more easily discuss online safety and privacy issues. We even ask a couple extra credit questions to make this a custom experience.

When you're done, you'll have a personalized, official family agreement that you and your kid can feel good about. Just print it out, sign it, and put it on the fridge for everyone to see.
